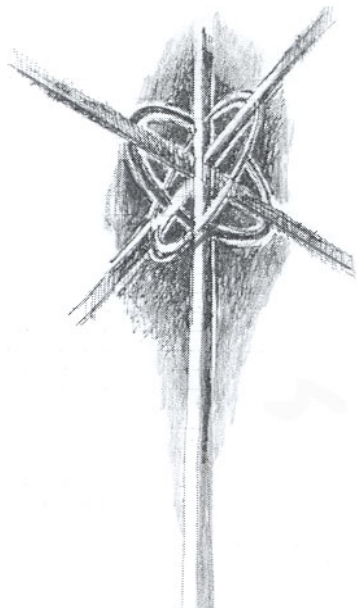

The Challenge

The Season of Immigrants and Refugees

A favorite Taizé CD of mine has on it a Kyrie Eleison with this verse:

Holy God, You wish to reconcile the whole human race,
teach us to welcome refugees and immigrants,
to form with them a single people
that belongs to You, we pray to you O God.

It's the season to think about this. Jesus began his life as an immigrant, and political refugee. Mary and Joseph and the baby fled to Egypt escaping Herod's homeland security forces. They knew the agony the poet speaks of, a family "who are not from this place, but neither from that place."

Jesus, Mary, Joseph, fleeing for their lives then.

And now, they still are. This time, economic refugees, but still fleeing for their lives. Forced to leave their own beloved countries by devastating trade policies that destroy communities and impoverish millions. Policies that our Democratic and Republican politicians and policy makers authored, approved and championed.

And, when the inevitable happens, when the destitute cast their eyes on American as their hope, what has been our government's response, the same government that sent them fleeing in the first place? Walls, prisons, deportations, the sundering of families.

We must demand a different way. A sea change in trade policy so that livelihoods can once again be earned, and communities restored, in the countries from which the desperate immigrants come. May the church in the US be the prophetic voice calling for this change in policy.

And may the people of the US remember our own beginnings as immigrants, and have mercy.

Mary, Joseph, Jesus, immigrants and refugees.

Let us make room for them now, indeed.

Imagine being Native American with a prison record, without money, skills, a home, or a job in a collapsing economy and in a Minnesota winter. He has asked Chris to arrange a cell phone for him to facilitate getting a job and setting up the rest of his post-prison life. If you are unhappy about the rate at which our country incarcerates people, especially minorities, and the poor job done to transition prisoners back into productive life, here is your chance to contribute to the solution. Christmas Sharing Trees

It is that time of year again where we buy gifts for those less fortunate than we are.

This year, we will have 4 Christmas sharing trees for the following organizations/places:

1. The Women's Wisdom Circle, which helps American Indian women who have AIDS.
2. Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, one of the poorest reservations in the United States with up to 80% unemployment.
3. **Deadline has past** -ICA in conjunction with the Hopkins Resource Center: The resource center addresses services for people in need and creates a place to go where they can receive information and referral services in one location. ICA is an emergency food shelf and financial assistance agency serving the seven west metro communities of Minnetonka, Hopkins, Excelsior, Deephaven, Shorewood, Woodland, and Greenwood.
4. YWCA Children's Center: provides full time child care and education for low-income children on East Lake Street in south Minneapolis. The children, infants through school age are mostly children of single Moms working their way off welfare or of students at South High School or of parents working very low-income jobs. Most are African American, Latino or African. Because the families are facing multiple stresses, the gifts we provide are often the children's primary present and, as such are greatly appreciated by the Moms as well as the children.

An offer you may not want to refuse...

You've been reading about it, hearing about it, seeing posters of it. And now...the Environmental Focus Group is excited to **offer to St Luke the PermaCulture Design Course**. Led by **Guy Trombley**, we course participants will learn our way into a design for our 4.2 acres which will create a healthy, sustainable whole that is grounded by a set of ethical principles: care for the earth, care for people, and sharing surplus.

We are looking for 12-16 committed people one Saturday per month from 9:00 -4:00 pm with possible follow up on Sundays (1 to 1 ½ hours) after church beginning in January. The course is scheduled on the following Saturdays:

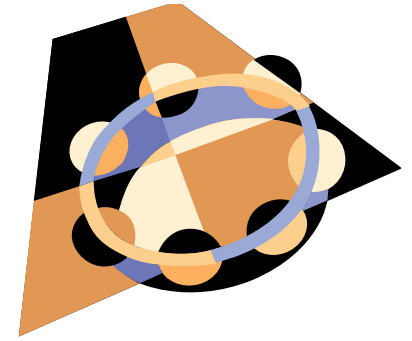
Faith And Politics

Women Who Run With Horses: An Invitation

Thursday, January 15 – 6:00-9:00 pm at St Luke

If you have been hearing a loud cry, or even a soft whisper (perhaps a whinny), from the deep longing of your heart calling you to know your wild soul, then join us. If you want to give time to listen to the wisdom of your soul and to live more in alignment with your core being, come be with us.

If you have been curious about horses, through experience or intuition (no previous experience needed), and how they can be participants in expanding your soul work, then come with your questions.

This invitation is a call for a deep work of soul, opening your heart to its vast healing capacities in a world hungering for this kind of presence of Love.

Details: This is an exciting opportunity to join a group of women and horses to do intentional study. The two primary texts will be *Riding between the Worlds* By Linda Kahnov (www.eponacenter.com) and *Nature and the Human Soul* by Bill Plotkin (www.natureandthehumansoul.com). Other resources such as *Christ and the Celts* by Philip Newell will be referenced.

One Saturday a month will involve working with horses in an indoor arena. This is ground communication, not riding, and requires no previous experience with horses. This work will be under the direction of Molly Depreckle who is a licensed counselor and Equine Assisted Therapist. The process is described in *Riding between the Worlds* by Linda Kahnov.

One Thursday a month, the group will integrate the learning from the horse experiences and the assigned readings through sharing and related activities. This will be facilitated by AJ Pratt and Judy Gregg.

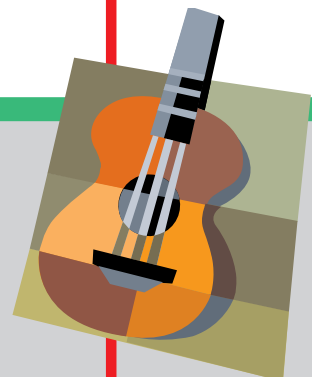

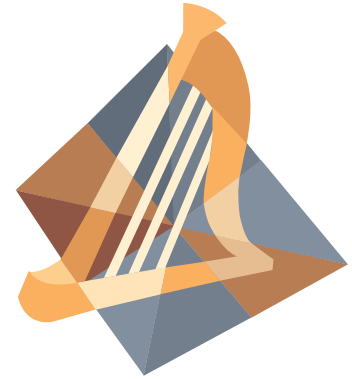
