Rev. Anita Bradshaw





Youth Group Highlights



In January the youth group did a 2-part series on racism, including watching and discussing the movie *Selma*. The youth summed it up perfectly, saying, "Why did people ever get treated this way?" Another remarked, "If you look at the news...I don't think these problems have actually been solved."

In February the youth group met to tackle food insecurity, addressing eight typical barriers to food supplies. They then went to Feed My Starving Children and packed food for 90 minutes. Returning to church, they talked about how these activities fit



into our Lenten themes of alms-giving, fasting and love.

At the March 18 lock-in the youth will discuss Easter, resurrection and reinvention for today's times. Why do popstars reinvent themselves? What is accomplished? Is there an innate craving for resurrection? How does God move through our lives as created—or recreated—people?

Spirited Learning

St. Luke's participation and offerings have been tremendous.

About 30 people participated in discussion on the book *The New Jim Crow.* For a new take on a tough topic, the moderator, Lori Alford, requested a focus on personal and spiritual responsibility.

St. Lukers also gathered to watch the movie *Ghandi*, splitting it into two evenings to allow more time for discussion. They were inspired by the ideal and *practice* of nonviolence.

The 3-part series on Syrian Refugees was also fascinating—yet disturbing. Half of the Syrian population is now displaced. Let us hold them all in our prayers.

On March 6 at 9:15am, Minnesota resident Jay Shahidi will continue his enlightening narrative of Iran and its history.
