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Dear St. Luke Community,

Even before I arrived at St. Luke, I heard in the search process – the church needs to grow in membership. This is not a simple matter of following a recipe and having instant results. It means a variety of strategies internally and externally to make us ready to receive and welcome newcomers into our community.

I will be offering some workshops later this spring on what it means to be a growing, vital, healthy and thriving church. These sessions will challenge us to think about how we currently do things and what we might want to do to move forward.

Here are some immediate thoughts:

- Pretend you are a visitor to St. Luke and know nothing and no one in the congregation. Approach the church through those eyes and see what ideas come to mind. What questions would you have? What concerns would you have? What would you need to feel welcome and at home?
- Do I look for newcomers each Sunday and make a point of welcoming them personally? Do I get to know them a bit? Do I introduce them to others?
- Why do we want to grow our church? What do we hope to accomplish?
- Am I ready for the changes that might need to happen to grow and am I ready for the changes that might happen with new people and new ideas?



Lent is Almost Here!

This year we will be offering several ways for St. Lukers to take a moment and pause in Lent to consider our spiritual lives. I want to thank the Worship Focus Group for their good work in planning our Lenten season.

The first is our Ash Wednesday service on February 10 at 6:00 pm. We will come together for a short service, Taizé-style, and with the imposition of ashes for those who would like to receive them.

Second, we will include in the opening of worship a sung *Kyrie*. It is a simple way to remind ourselves of the grace of God present in our lives.

Third, on March 20 we will celebrate Palm and Passion Sunday at our regular 10:30 am Sunday service.

Fourth, we will gather on Maundy Thursday, March 24 at 7:00 pm for a service of communion remembering the Last Supper and a service of Tenebrae with candles and a reader's theatre to remember the last day of Jesus' life.

Fifth, following the conclusion of the Maundy Thursday service, we will offer a 24-hour vigil of prayer for all those who wish to sign up to pray for an hour. You can pray at the church or at your home, but our hope is that everyone will take an hour to meditate, pray and reflect. More details on how to sign-up to come.

All of this will lead us to a celebration of Easter on March 27. I invite you, even if you are skeptic about these celebrations to give them a try and perhaps rethink what the tradition and your faith are for you.

St. Luke Hosts Three-Part Series on the Syrian Civil War and Refugee Crisis

More than 250,000 Syrians have lost their lives in four and a half years of armed conflict, which began with nonviolent anti-government protests before escalating into a full-scale civil war. The conflict is now more than just a battle between those for or against President Assad. It has acquired sectarian overtones, pitching the country's Sunni majority against the president's Shia Alawite sect, and drawn in neighboring countries and world powers. This is an epic humanitarian crisis with more than 11 million Syrians displaced---half the country's pre-crisis-population. Four in five now live in poverty.

St. Luke will hear from several Syrian-Americans about what their organizations are doing to support Syria's citizens and refugees, and how St. Luke can help.

Each of these events will be held on Sundays at 9:15 in the West Room prior to worship.

February 14 – Mazen Halabi is a community activist who came to the U.S. when he was 18 and has family still in Syria. He will talk about the mission and humanitarian work of SAMS- Syrian American Medical Society.

February 21 – Susan Boulad is an international law student at the University of Minnesota. She has been a prominent face and spokesperson in the Metro Area's events for support of and humanitarian aid for Syrian refugees and citizens.

February 28 - Details To be Announced

The discussion will center around how we as individuals, St. Lukers, and the U.S. can respond to this devastating humanitarian crisis in Syria.



We are reading "The Sandcastle Girls" by Chris Bohjalian. This spellbinding tale travels between Aleppo, Syria, in 1915 and Bronxville, New York, in 2012—a sweeping historical love story steeped in the author's Armenian heritage, making it his most personal novel to date:

When Elizabeth Endicott arrives in Syria, she has a diploma from Mount Holyoke College, a crash course in nursing, and only the most basic grasp of the Armenian language. The First World War is spreading across Europe, and she has volunteered on behalf of the Boston-based Friends of Armenia to deliver food and medical aid to refugees of the Armenian genocide. There, Elizabeth becomes friendly with Armen, a young Armenian engineer who has already lost his wife and infant daughter. When Armen leaves Aleppo to join the British Army in Egypt, he begins to write Elizabeth letters, and comes to realize that he has fallen in love with the wealthy, young American woman who is so different from the wife he lost.

Personal note: Our own Katie Williams is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College. Also, I have letters that were written by my grandfather who was serving as a medical missionary in Armenia during that time period. He also helped the genocide victims.

He teaches at Georgetown University and recently served on the White House Advisory Council on Faith-based and Neighborhood Partnerships. He currently serves on the Global Agenda Council on Values of the World Economic Forum. His bestselling books include *The (Un)Common Good* and *Rediscovering Values: A Guide for Economic and Moral Recovery.* His latest book, *America's Original Sin*, is as personal and prophetic challenge to overcome the racism that persists in American Society.



St. Luke Educational Scholarships

Since 1972, the St. Luke Scholarship Fund has awarded educational scholarships to St. Luke participants. Funding for these scholarships has come from generous donors in the congregation and is administered by the Legacy Focus Group. We are pleased to announce that applications are being accepted for several scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 2016.

One \$2,000 St. Luke Scholarship for STEM Excellence will provide financial support for a high-achieving undergraduate student pursuing work in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. The combination of one of these fields with ecology/environmental studies will be given added weight. Applicants must be members of St. Luke Presbyterian Church and/or have shown regular, active participation in St. Luke or St. Luke youth programs for at least two years. Preference will be given to applicants with high grades, ACT scores above 30, and those having been accepted into a school of science, technology, engineering or math. Applicants will not be limited by financial status. One \$2,000 scholarship, payable to the educational institution, shall be granted per year, if qualifications are met. This scholarship is not renewable.

Three \$1000 <u>Woolworth Scholarships</u> will be awarded to motivated high school seniors from St. Luke with a goal of graduating with a bachelor's degree in science, history or education. The scholarship shall be for a period of one year, payable to the educational institution.

Application forms are due by February 19, 2016. Award notifications will be made no later than March 29, 2016 and a formal presentation will be made during a worship service in April or May. Applicants may apply for both scholarships, if qualified, but can only be awarded one. More information and application forms may be obtained by emailing nsfisher09@comcast.net.

Also, the Legacy Focus Group will be administering the **Karen L. Johnson Scholarship** for youth and their chaperones engaged in mission, service and educational travel experiences. Information about the application process for these travel scholarships will come in the spring of 2016.




'Reel to Real' Movie Night

The Way (2010, PG-13, 123 minutes)

"The Way" is a powerful and inspirational story about family, friends and the challenges we face while navigating this everchanging and complicated world. Martin Sheen plays Tom, an American doctor who comes to St. Jean Pied de Port, France to collect the remains of his adult son (played by Emilio Estevez), killed in the Pyrenees in a storm while walking the Camino de Santiago, also known as The Way of Saint James. Rather than return home, Tom decides to embark on the historical pilgrimage to honor his son's desire to finish the journey. What Tom doesn't plan on is the profound impact the journey will have on him and his "California Bubble Life". Inexperienced as a trekker, Tom soon discovers that he will not be alone on this journey. On his journey, Tom meets other pilgrims from around the world, each with their own issues and looking for greater meaning in their lives: a Dutchman (Yorick van Wageningen), a Canadian (Deborah Kara Unger) and an Irish writer (James Nesbitt), who is suffering from a bout of writer's block. From the unexpected and, often times, amusing experiences along the way, this unlikely quartet of misfits creates an everlasting bond and Tom begins to learn what it means to be a citizen of the world again. Through Tom's unresolved relationship with his son, he discovers the difference between "the life we live and the life we choose".

Faith Formation Update

There is good news to report from the Faith Formation Focus Group! Most recently, we held a successful youth group meeting on MLK Day instead of spending the entire weekend at the Fire and Ice camp. We had decided to opt out of that trip for a number of reasons, including 12 hours of travel time and lack of programming at the center. Since schools were closed that day, we offered a midday youth group meeting to further examine the role of race in our past and discuss events in the Black Lives Matter movement. We watched the movie, "Selma" and Lori Alford facilitated a discussion among the eleven youth who came to church on their day off of school.

Along the lines of re-capping recent events, we also hosted the worship experience on Sunday, December 20th. Although there has traditionally been a pageant, we wanted a more meaningful and interactive experience for all involved. During worship we invited adults from the congregation to meet with kids at reflection stations located throughout the sanctuary. We asked adults to "meet a child you don't know today and hear what they have to teach you." We've received a tremendous amount of positive feedback about the day. Several people have remarked that they did indeed meet someone they hadn't known and have also formed a relationship grounded in the common religious experience. The 15 stations were staffed by 43 of St. Luke's children and youth that morning.

You may have also noticed that the carpet in the sanctuary has been removed. The reason is that we are asking children to sit with their families as they come into the sanctuary so that they can learn what it means to participate in worship. After the opening prayer they are invited to go to the East Room to participate in reflection stations. (If you haven't seen the kids doing this, please pop in when you can: it's a wonderful process of youth leaders teaching Bible stories to younger children, exploring through reading, art, and of course, play!) Depending on the length of those lessons, children return to the sanctuary for the offering and final prayers. The nursery is now expanded, open and staffed for families with small children.

Finally, the events coming up are very exciting. There is a youth lock-in on February 12th on the theme of "Hearing the Call to Serve." We will also be organizing an upcoming service project packaging food at Feed My Starving Children in Chanhassen. Youth in grades 6-12 will soon receive continued leadership training that will support the education of younger children in learning the stories of Jesus.

As we enter Lent, we'll spend time in Reflection Stations creating "Lenten Lapbooks" that kids will bring home to follow through the days of Lent. This book will be a great way to experience the stories of Lent and Holy Week as a family so be sure to come to church on February 7th!

Looking into the spring/summer timeframe, we are developing a service project for our youth group in June. All youth (6th-12th grade) have an opportunity to give back to a St. Luke member. On Saturday June 11 we will meet to remove old paint and do prep-work for a new paint job at a member's house. On June 18 we will gather to put on the new paint. Stay tuned for more details!
