In each of the four gospel accounts of the Easter story, we find a determined group of women gathering to undertake the important work of tending to Jesus' body. Their courage alone is an admirable lesson for us. In the midst of disappointment and despair, they are taking risky steps to care for their teacher and guide: one just recently condemned as a rabble-rouser and an enemy of the state. The women are strong and unafraid, and yet there is a challenge that lies in front of them. Who will roll away the stone away? As they approach the tomb they find, to their awe and surprise, that the stone has already been rolled away. New life, new hope and all of the frightening possibilities that come with both have suddenly been resurrected in their midst.

I believe that we here at St. Luke are experiencing a similar moment. We've gone through a long season of transition filled for many, I imagine, with at least some fear of the great unknown. Calling, commitment, purpose and care have not been lacking, but time and transitions come with barriers of their own.

As we conclude the season of Lent and emerge into the warmth of spring, I encourage us to see with new eyes and fresh hope; to work together with collaboration and care; and to dream with possibility of resurrection and renewal. Now is the time to join the story and roll the stone away!

May we together find the strength, patience and wisdom to remove those barriers that may be holding us back from the work that we are called to do and share together. I look forward to the joy of sharing in this work of dreaming and doing.

It's a great time to be together here at St. Luke. May God grant us wisdom and courage for the bright and collaborative future that lies ahead us.

Session Slices

From the meeting of March 20, 2018

In March, Session enthusiastically approved two restructuring recommendations – one for St. Luke Legacy Program and one for Outreach and Social Justice Ministries at St. Luke.

The **Legacy Program** has been restructured to be more responsive and effective in directly benefiting the Church's ministry and missions and includes the creation of a new One-To-One Fund and a Building Reserve Fund. Each shift aims to help us share the story of St. Luke's Legacy Program. Details will be shared with the congregation in April and are available from the Legacy Focus Group (Don Davies, Connie Branson, Judy Schuck, Randy Schumacher, Steve Warner).

The Session adopted a proposal to restructure our approach to **Social Justice** (formerly "Outreach"), including the creation of a Social Justice Collaboration Team to guide us in strategic collaboration. The proposal affirms our commitment to a process of engagement in the areas of racial justice, economic justice and climate justice. Collaboration Team members will include Social Outreach Elders, leaders for each of the three justice areas, interested chairs of all former Outreach Focus Groups, our two pastors and other interested St. Lukers. Further information will be shared with the congregation as the Team progresses.

Session discussed a new Green Faith Certification Program for environmental leadership by faith.


Book Study

The Wisdom Jesus: *Transforming Heart & Mind -- a New Perspective on Christ and His Message* by Cynthia Bourgeault

April 11 - May 23

Jesus' followers didn't know how the story would turn out. What drew people to him? New information from the Nag Hammadi Codex (early Christian sacred writings, including the Gospel of Thomas), oral traditions used among early Syrian-speaking Christians, the Dead Sea Scrolls, and a reawakening of the Christian tradition of contemplative meditation lead the way to considering Jesus from less familiar perspectives. Let's see what we can learn from the Wisdom tradition, which focuses on the path. It emphasizes how Jesus is like us -- "how what he did in himself is something we are also called to do in ourselves." One group will meet Wednesdays, 7:00-8:30 pm, and another will meet during the day, depending on members' availability.

Organics Recycling at St. Luke

Organics Collection is coming!

St. Luke is participating in an organics recycling program in which we will separate our organic waste from our garbage. Recycling organics plays an important role in easing the burden on the environment. Conservatively, and probably more than, 50% of what we send to the landfill is organics and could be recycled into compost. Ask any gardener about the value of compost. This is as close to alchemy as we have ever come! Pure gold!



What are organics? Was it living at one time? And now is it wet, sticky, dirty, slimy or snotty? Then it is organic and compostable! Here at St. Luke our organics will be mostly paper towels, coffee cups, coffee grounds, tea bags, kleenex, napkins, paper plates and pizza boxes.

What is so great about compost? Finished compost is an organic-rich soil amendment that is used to improve soil structure and water-holding capacity of soils and minimize leaching of nutrients. Compost prevents soil erosion and polluted storm water runoff from contaminating our wetlands, lakes and streams. In addition, compost can also be used to reclaim marginal soils and can be used in gardens, golf courses, playing fields, road construction projects and landscaping.

How does it work? All organic items are placed in a receptacle separate from recycling and garbage (please continue to recycle recyclable items). Randy, our custodian, will “package” the organics in special blue bags and take them outside to the carts (yes, no more dumpster) From here, the organics are delivered to a composting facility where it is recycled into valuable compost.

Watch for specifically labeled receptacles in the Kitchen, Garden Court and bathrooms.

April 8: Avenues for Homeless Youth

Avenues for Homeless Youth provides emergency shelter, short-term housing and supportive services for homeless youth in a safe and nurturing environment. Through such service, Avenues seeks to help youth achieve their personal goals and make a positive transition into young adulthood.

Avenues works to achieve its mission through two residential shelter houses, host home programs, and a young families program. Each year approximately 75% of Avenues' program youth are able to move on to stable housing and take the next steps toward their dreams.

Craig Freeman is the Community Engagement Manager at Avenues for Homeless Youth. Craig will discuss the 6,000 youth aged 16-24 who are homeless and unaccompanied every night in Minnesota, and how Avenues helps these youth move from surviving the streets to thriving young adults.

April 15: Economic Justice and Fair Trade

Peru natives Juan Llerena and Guisela Pinto will speak about economic justice and fair trade. They operate Divas Fair Trade, a local organization based in Waconia whose mission is to work with small producers, hand in hand, by creating sources of work to help them sustain a better standard of living while preserving their rich and authentic culture. They treat every individual (producers, employees, clients) with respect, working together to achieve a common goal. Divas Fair Trade has sold merchandise regularly for a number of years now at the St. Luke annual holiday fair trade event.

Meals on Wheels

Meals on Wheels South Shore provides nutritious home delivered meals to older adults and people with disabilities who are unable to prepare the food for themselves or travel to a site where a meal is being served. St. Luke helps by providing 7 drivers one day a month. Currently, our permanent drivers are Jim Thompson, Chuck Hommeyer, Judy Kim, Katie Williams, Todd Lindberg, Judy Leatham and Bill Erickson. As the coordinators of Meals on Wheels, Gretchen Otto and I wish to thank these people, and all of those individuals who sub when needed, for their ongoing, and reliable commitment to this program.

At this time, the program is in need of a Substitute Meal Coordinator. This person would work at Mount Calvary Church in Excelsior a minimum of 2 four-hour shifts each month, with occasional longer stretches as the present coordinator Tom Lindquist may need. Youth Day at the Capitol for Climate Justice April 25, 2018, 8:30 am - 2:30 pm

Providing Overnight Shelter Here to Homeless Families

We are again hosting several homeless families with children in our church from Sun. Apr. 15 to Sun. Apr. 22 who are in Beacon's Families Moving Forward program. They arrive in the late afternoon, stay overnight, and leave in the early morning. We provide dinner, breakfast, hospitality, and overnight shelter. We volunteer as Co-Dinner Hosts, Support Hosts, Co-Overnight Hosts, and Cleanup Helpers.

Many Volunteer Positions Needed

Two **Dinner Hosts** each evening divide up the cooking for up to 18 people. Dinner hosts prepare meals at home from our pre-planned dinner menu, bring them to church, serve at 6:30 pm, eat with our guests, and cleanup. The church supplies beverages.

Several **Support Hosts** each evening arrive at 6:45 pm and leave at 8:15 pm. They socialize with the families, watch their children playing inside our church, outside on our playground, or at Groveland's School's playground. They may play games with the children. They help create a caring and supportive atmosphere for our guest families. Your children or grandchildren are welcome and appreciated.

Two **Overnight Hosts** each evening arrive at 8:00 p.m. and leave the next morning at 7:15 am (9:15 am Sat). They socialize with the families, provide overnight security, and ensure that the families are on the bus arriving at our front door in the morning. Each night two Overnight Hosts sleep in their sleeping bags on spring supported cots; each Host in one of the church's offices.
