It's been a delight to feel our Sanctuary humming with activity; to see our columbarium welcoming worshippers of all ages and stages; to hear choir singing together again; and to know that our children are basking in their new outdoor Sunday School classroom in the woods, made possible by our grounds restoration effort. It's true that some things are different. That some of us are different, in fact. Yet, we're still called and committed to come together through it all. For that, I give great thanks.

The Season Ahead

You may have noticed that we are loading up on special events this fall: outdoor fellowship, extra grounds workdays, a Blessing of the Animals service, youth activities, a labyrinth unveiling, and more. As you may have guessed, we aim to make the most of these warm weather weeks, not knowing for sure what the winter may hold. Here and now, there are safe and creative ways that we can gather to build beloved community while embracing our mission – and we're going to embrace these weeks with open arms. If there is a "time and season for every matter under the sun," as Ecclesiastes puts it, then it's important that we as a community embrace these seasons of easy (or easier) connection and

harvest the joy around us. I encourage each of us to harvest some joy and community. And then harvest some more, storing enough for whatever the future may hold.

Speaking of the future, I'd like to take a moment here to share some **hopes and highlights for the coming months**.

- Our Social Justice Collaboration Team is well on the way to designating our outbound mission and giving commitments for 2021. We're on track to share forward over \$80,000 in outbound mission support this year!
- Later this month, you will each receive a special "look book" detailing the vision and scope of the new St. Luke Community Kitchen project that the Session has newly launch. I promise everyone a thorough overview of the project, space details, cost and timeline – as well as a thorough call to support this investment in the life and mission of St. Luke! In the meantime, I'd like to highlight two important dynamics of the project:

1. This is far more than an investment in the internal life of St. Luke. We've named this project the St. Luke <u>Community</u> Kitchen because we are intentionally investing in a flexible, modern space for our community and coalitional partners, in addition to our internal use. This project will deepen our commitment to be a gathering hub for all those in the West Metro area interested in joining together for peace, justice, compassion, spirituality and the arts.

2. The financial ask, in brief: we are looking to the St. Luke community to help raise \$60k to pull off this unique investment in our future. While the total project comes in at \$120k, we're already halfway there with a \$20k grant from the Presbytery and a \$40k gift from our Legacy Group made possible by the Ed and Judy Schuck Legacy gift. Any amount raised over and beyond our project expenses will go directly to the ICA Food Shelf.

 Finally, a reminder that your creative ideas, affirmations and constructive feedback are always welcome as we continue to navigate an uncommon season of ministry together. We aim to host a meaningful fall and Advent season together, which will include the return of the St. Luke Christmas Gift Making Workshop and our Fair-Trade Gift Fair. Creativity and mindful planning will continue to be paramount, though



Session Slices

From the Session Meeting of September 21, 2021

Highlights of Recent Services: Session members discussed Come Together Sunday as a good example of how we can have a children's sermon, hear the choir sing outdoors, and share coffee and treats safely. The memorial service for Greg Smith was beautiful with about 140 in attendance (plus church members viewing on-line), and food served outdoors. Our sincere thanks go to the staff, deacons, and others who have made these events seem so effortless.

Community Kitchen Update: Cliff and Brennan presented kitchen expansion plans to an enthusiastic adult education audience on September 19. St. Luke has received a \$20,000 grant from the Presbytery for the project, which is estimated to cost \$120,000. The Legacy Focus Group has newly committed \$40,000 from legacy funds for the kitchen project. Session voted unanimously to proceed with the project, with further details on fundraising and construction timelines to be presented soon. Our goal is to have a kitchen reopening in the spring!

Zoom vs. In-person: Session briefly discussed the benefits and drawbacks of meeting in-person or remotely. While we long for being in the same room together, we agreed that, for now, Zoom is safer and allows for those with small children or those traveling out-of-state to participate more easily.

The book group will meet at 9:30, Wednesday, October 13, at church.


We will read and discuss **Blink** by Malcolm Gladwell:

There are thousands of Native people living in the Twin Cities, and the Division of Indian Works (DIW) serves many of them. DIW, a long-time partner of St. Luke, recently reached out to ask for assistance as they prepare to re-open many of their services this fall. The pandemic hit Native communities hard, and the need to help families continues.

St. Luke is responding to this need by having a drive for specific items this fall. You can bring items to St. Luke on the **2nd Saturday** in October, November, and December: **Oct. 9, Nov. 13, and Dec. 11 from 11:30-1:30.**

And you are not limited to those days to donate items! Donations can also be dropped off at Sunday worship or when the church is open Mon-Thurs. 8:30-4:00 (table at the back left corner of the Garden Court).
